

MINISTRY REPORT

E te whanau, greetings.

In the Rev Jekheli's absence I have been asked to write something for Charter and share with you a reflection I wrote a few years ago. I have called it — "The Original Love Story."

One of the greatest theologians that ever lived, Karl



He turned to the renowned theologian and asked, 'Of all the theological insights you have ever had, which do you, consider the greatest of them all?'

It was the perfect question for a man who had literally written tens of thousands of pages of some of the most sophisticated theology put into print. The students held their pencils poised ready to take down verbatim the premier insight of the greatest theologian of their time.

Karl Barth closed his tired eyes, and he thought for a minute, and then he half smiled, opened his eyes, and said to the young seminarians, 'The greatest theological insight that I have ever had is this: 'Jesus loves me, this I know, for the Bible tells me so.'

I submit to you that the gospel of Jesus Christ is the greatest love story ever written!

I thank God that Christmas comes around once each year to remind us that God isn't in the business of keeping books and tallying ledgers, nor is God concerned about our status or position in life. If God were concerned about any of these things, then I submit to you that the Christ of God would never have been born in such disagreeable circumstances.

No. Christmas is the beginning of a classic love story with all the right ingredients: infatuation, pursuit, risk and relationship....

In all relationships of love there has to be a first meeting, a point of connection, a crossing of paths....

I submit to you, that Christmas is this point -

Christmas is a crossing of paths....

Christmas is where we find the Christ of God intersecting with humanity.

If it wasn't for Christmas, we might never have known the intensity of the love that God has for us.

Mary and Joseph, far from home because of imperial rule, a peasant mother giving birth in unsanitary substandard housing. There was no fanfare, no royal delegation. They just laid him in that manger and watched his little face, and they listened for his breathing, just like every new parent does.

Who would have guessed that this crossing of paths, this intersection of the divine and the human, would take place so long ago in a remote, speck of dust village called Bethlehem of Judea?

Who would have guessed that in that time and place One would be born into our world who would one day fill his life with so much of the experience of God, so much with the love of God, that in him thousands upon thousands would be moved to make the incredible claim that they had actually met God in person.

We are approaching the day when God sent out a love letter of cosmic proportions!

And as Jesus grew and went out into the world, so our understanding of just how much God loves us also grew. We find in Jesus that God's love doesn't demand perfection, that forgiveness isn't given away sparingly, but recklessly and indiscriminately, that unconditional really means unconditional, and that God's love is completely and thoroughly inclusive.

Having said this I also know that Christmas is a time of sentiment and memories, and can cause a measure of sorrow to come into focus. We often think about failures we have suffered and loved ones lost.

Christmas is the living promise that we are never ever alone. No matter where we are in life, no matter in what condition we find ourselves, no matter how far we might stray away, or how unfaithful we are, God, the supreme lover, will pursue us in love for eternity.

It's a love that never stops shining.

I give thanks the opportunity to have been available over the past few weeks, and thank especially Mary West who shared her gifts as a lay preacher over this time. Thank you all for your support.

May God bless each of you and those you love this Christmas Season.




- The Wednesday Holy Communion Service will run until the 21st December and then recommence on on the 1st February 2023.

The Executive Team

It is now almost three years since Chartwell Church took a leap of faith and formed the Executive Team! The purpose of the Team is to manage day-to-day operations so that the Parish Council has space to take care of strategy and governance.

This arrangement seems to be working well. Obviously, Covid forced the Team to be rather more nimble than initially anticipated and adaptation became the norm. After three years, though it is time to check in and make sure that the Team is doing all it could and should. We'll be asking those interesting questions: what is working well; what isn't; what should we stop doing; and what should we start doing? It will be interesting to see what comes out of the conversations that will arise from considering these questions.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Warwick Silvester and Seddon Polglase for their contributions as founding members of the Team. We wouldn't be where we are today without them. They both brought a wealth of experience, lots of enthusiasm and a sincere desire to see Chartwell Church continue to succeed as the wonderful church we know and love.

I also need to make a request. After Warwick stepped down as the Executive Team Chair earlier this year, I offered to step back into the role until the end of this year. So we need someone who is willing to fill that position for next year. While I was Chair I was also writing grant applications, helping to run the Annual Fair and Book Sale, working on ICT initiatives and preaching regularly at Insight. That is not a sustainable portfolio long-term! So the person we are looking for would be solely responsible for coordinating the Executve Team: manage the agenda, chair the monthly meeting, write the minutes, ensure the necessary documents are delivered to the Parish Council members for their monthly meeting and oversee actions in progress. I estimate that all up the role requires 12 to 15 hours per month. If organising is your thing, please give this opportunity serious consideration.

Finally, I would like to thank Amie and Keri for the amazing work they do, often unseen, to keep Chartwell Church functioning. They take care of a huge number of jobs that make everyone's lives easier.

It was fabulous to be able to have our *normal* Annual Fair this year. While the amount we raised was less than budgeted, it was consistent with the economic constraints so many are facing. We are very grateful that the community came out in force as always to support this enterprise. The Fair is so much more than just a fundraiser – it is a chance for the church community to band together, for us to support the wider community with decent, reasonably-priced goods and an opportunity to interact with the wider community.

We have also received several grants in the last six months from Trust Waikato and from two new funders: the Norah Howell Trust and the Page Trust. It is a testament to the quality of our community programmes that funders such as these are willing to support us.

Finance Report: October 2022

- Total parish income is around \$4,000 ahead of budget Year to date, in spite of decreased income from the Fair, as a result of increased giving and hall hire.
 - ⇒ Income from giving is around \$7,000 higher than budgeted
 - ⇒ Income from Hall hire is around \$1,000 higher than budgeted
 - ⇒ The fair and related Trademe sales have returned \$14,590 (after costs) so far, compared to a budget of \$18,500.
- This increased income is important given the budget was for a cash loss this financial year of over \$20,000.

Costs

- Ministry related costs are \$4,600 higher than budget YTD.
- Property costs are \$1,362 higher than budget as the cost of insurance has increased by more than we had planned for.

Flsie Blackmoore was a foundation member of the Chartwell Golden Oldies (previous Club name) and was a very regular member for 35 vears.



- Induction of the Presidential team for 2022-2024 President Rev. Peter Taylor (last parish- Lindisfarne Invercargill.) Vice President TeRito Peyroux – Semu (member of Rotuman Parish Auckland) past National youth worker MCNZ
- Presidential team for 2024-2026 President elect <u>Te Aroha Rountree</u>, member of Te Taha Māori- lecturer at Trinity College. <u>Vice President elect</u>. <u>Rev. Peter Norman</u>, Presbyter- Takapuna Parish Auckland.
- New venture to be initiated via the Methodist website in December 2022
 GREEN GRANTS FOR PARISHES that are exploring ideas to assist climate change.
 One example given was for some assistance towards installing SOLAR PANELS.
 I hope that the parish council will explore this possibility.
- YEAR OF DISCERNMENT- from 2023 any person who is interested in their future
 in Methodist ministry will have to participate in this programme which has been
 prepared between Trinity College and Mission Resourcing. The parish presbyter is
 the person to guide the interested member.
- Congratulations Rev. Dr Susan Thompson (past synod superintendent) has been elected to be a member of the World Council of Churches Central committee.
 This is an 8-year appointment for only one person from NZ. The Anglican, Presbyterian and Methodist churches rotate the representative.
- One session was spent with a report from the <u>Royal Commission of Inquiry into</u> the abuse of children and young people in care. Unfortunately, MCNZ was not blameless in both children's homes and Wesley College. This was not easy to hear.
- Two items of concern which President Peter must address include the <u>recent</u>
 <u>resignation of the board members of Mission Resourcing</u>. The second concern is
 exploring a way to ensure <u>ongoing funding to support the ministry of the</u>
 <u>Children's Ministry</u> which is a part of Mission resourcing.

CHRISTMAS CAKE RECIPE

(warning: contains alcohol)

Ingredients

1 cup sugar
 1 tsp baking powder

1 cup water1 tsp salt1 cup brown sugarLemon juice

4 large eggs
 Nuts

• 1 bottle Vodka 2 Cups of dried fruit
