Minister's Report:

That God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them. And he has committed to us the message of reconciliation. (2 Cor 5:19)

welcome her husband Ryan and their children Ryder, Sophie and Scarlett. Serrina, may you find your ministry meaningful and fulfilling. May your whanau (family) find a home in Chartwell Church whanau as we serve God and God's people together.

To Amanda Bowcott, our thanks for your many years of ministry and the many lives you have blessed. You have given so much of yourself, skills and commitment to the Children, Youth and Family ministry. You continue to contribute to many aspects of the parish life with dedication, enthusiasm and creativity. Thank you. Our thanks also to Amanda's husband Blair and their children Maddison, Kennedy and Jackson for their love and support. May God continue to bless you all.

I also thank each one of you, our church family, for your ongoing support for our Children, Youth and Family ministry. It is through the gifts of your prayers, time, skills, resources, and finances, that we can continue this very important ministry. Thank you all.

Amidst all the sad news around the world and here in Aotearoa NZ, especially the recent cyclone Gabrielle, we pray for people affected by cyclone Gabrielle and natural calamities around the world. A prayer from from Te Pīhopatanga o Aotearoa:

God of the present moment, God who in Jesus stills the storm and soothes the frantic heart; bring hope and courage to all those afflicted by Cyclone Gabrielle as they wait in uncertainty. Bring hope that you will make them the equal of whatever lies ahead. Bring them courage to endure what cannot be avoided, for your will is flourishing whanau and communities; you are God, and we need you. Amen.

There are times we ask ourselves, what difference can we make? We may even feel sad, overwhelmed or helpless. We do our part in the hope of making difference in

people's lives. As followers of Jesus, we are called to live in relationship with one another, our thoughts, actions and words reflecting the love and grace of Jesus Christ.

As we begin our Lenten journey (the 40 days leading up to Easter), it is very timely for us to pause, reflect, repent and take stock of where we are with God, with ourselves and with each other.

This year for our Lenten studies we will be working through the Difference course (Mondays Feb. 27-March 27, from 7:00-8:30 pm). We will explore together how, when we allow God to intervene in our realities, transformation can happen; the need to have the grace to see our diversity as a gift that can enrich each other's experiences, and not as a reason to be in our own clusters; practising forgiveness and doing relationships God's way. All welcome to come and join in this study. With our best intentions, life does not always turn out the way we plan - those curve balls that come our way, that we could really do without people in our lives that love and accept us, and those that God sends to help us grow in patience and grace. In his book, *The Power of Reconciliation* (Bloomsbury, 2022) Archbishop Justine Welby writes about reconciliation as "seeking to disagree well." This is applicable in all relationships and contexts.

Conflict is widespread, both at local and international levels. We can think of our own homes, workplaces, or in the church, where relationships breakdown or flourish because of how conflict is managed. One can never underestimate the power of one's thoughts, words, and actions in our everyday encounters.

If everything else around the world seems beyond our control, what about some aspects of our own lives? Jesus encourages us to reconcile, not brush the issues away or pretend they don't exist. Consider what he said, "So if you are offering your gift at the altar and there remember that your brother has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar. First go and be reconciled to your brother; then come and offer your gift." (Matthew 5:23-24). Jesus recognises that there will be differences. In choosing reconciliation, we don't assume all differences will end, it simply means the transformation of how we deal with difference.

Archbishop Welby further defines "peacebuilding and reconciliation in the sense of seeking relationships at all levels of human life that are resilient enough to have disagreement without destruction, victory without triumphalism, concessions without degradation. Reconciliation is the long-drawn-out process, extending sometimes over generations, which seeks to achieve that end. Peace is not found by avoiding conflict but by disagreeing well." (p.13) So, how do we procure the "capacity to disagree well"? Disagreeing well means we try and make room to respect human dignity, exercise patience with difference, and aim for effective and practical peaceful situations.

Every church community or human organisation often has unspoken dynamics of relationships with the potential to build up or break, nurture or disrupt the health of the body of Christ. What can I do about it? My humble task in this brief reflection is to encourage an open, honest and direct communication; to work on developing trust so we can accept each other's vulnerabilities and hold each other's stories with honour and respect. By doing our part here and now, we make a difference to the world we live in. You and I - along with the rest of creation, make up God's earth, our world. We are a part of God's universe.

If we decide on live a life that is indifferent to all the goings on of the church, "to each their own" mentality, we would be contradicting the very nature of God the Holy Trinity - the Three in One we believe in (Colo. 1:15-20). At the heart of Jesus' prayer for his followers was, "that all may be one, just as Father you are in me and I am in you. May they also be in us so that the world may believe that you have sent me." (John 17:21).

To try and live peaceably with each other (Rom 12:18) and be reconciled is based on our belief that the God we believe in is love and that we must love. "'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.'" (Matt. 22:37-38). Jesus' teachings go further in telling us to love our enemies: "You have heard that it was said, 'Love your neighbour and hate your enemy.' But I tell you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you," (Matt 5:43-44).

If we choose love, we can build bridges. To do that we need to be on both sides of the divide. A beautiful parable in Luke 10:25-35, known to us as the parable of the Good Samaritan, is a parable about a person who decided to cross the boundaries and do the right thing. Ultimately, the boundaries and the walls that we build are human made, after all.

We, the church, believe that we are the body of Christ and each member a part of it (1 Cor. 12). Our identity is interconnected in and through Jesus Christ. We are all beloved children of God, forgiven sinners, God's work of grace in progress, capable of being challenged and transformed within God's abounding mercy, called to be "forgiven forgivers, reconciled reconcilers" (p.209). None of us are beyond redemption. We repent. We believe. We hope. We reimagine. We journey to the cross and to the empty tomb, to fill our lives and make our lives meaning-full.

Jesus tells his followers to take up their cross and follow him (Mark 8:24), a call to a life of sacrifice and humility; the emptying of oneself so the richness of God's grace and life may flow. As we see God in our own lived experiences and stories, may we see God's image and God at work in all we encounter. May the forgiving, reconciling, gracious and loving God bless you this holy season of Lent.

March 13th	Navigating Disagreement : God is with us as we face the challenge of disagreement, which can become an opportunity for stronger relationships if handled well.

March 20th **Practising Forgiveness:** God is with us in the mess & complexity of trying to put forgiveness into practice in our relationships.

March 27th **Risking Hope**: Doing relationships God's way will sometimes be risky and resisted, but the hope it brings is transformative.

Parish Council Report



It has been a busy few months for me as Parish Council Chairperson, mostly around staffing. Firstly, there was the review of the Community Connections Facilitator role after its first year of existence. Daniel provided feedback on his work in this role, including where he saw potential for growth and improvements. The Parish Council met to discuss this feedback and unanimously decided to offer Daniel the role for a further year. Funding for the role will comprise of a grant from the Hamilton Methodist Trust for the internal aspects of the role (e.g. pastoral visiting, weekly prayer meeting) and external grants for the outward facing aspects (connections with the wider community, e.g. English language classes, men's dinner with a speaker). Praise God for the funding that has already been found for this valued role.

Additionally, I was involved in the recruitment for a new Children, Youth and Family Facilitator. The advertisement for this was reworded from the previous round, strategically advertised, and covered with prayer. We received a number of applications from many talented people and interviewed six people. We have now employed Serrina Henry-Malcolm into this important role. Please welcome Serrina and her family into the Chartwell Church family when you see them. Thank God for Amanda's ministry and for providing Serrina to carry on the torch.

Thank you to all of you who have prayed for these roles, these people, and those involved in recruiting, reviewing, and approving. I am interested to see where God is leading Chartwell Church next with our refreshed ministry team.

The first Parish Council meeting for 2023 will be at the end of February. We will be catching up on things since our last meeting in November, plus looking at the current progress of our Strategic Plan. Over the coming year we will continue to implement our Strategic Plan, which is in its last year. Please continue to pray for those on Parish Council; for wisdom, unity, and God's guidance.

English classes for new arrivals to NZ

Last year, Rev. Daniel Park initiated English classes for new arrivals to New Zealand.



Initially, the first class members were sourced from the Bible College in Gordonton but has quickly grown to include members of the public who seek support of English through directed teaching and conversation. A number of volunteers and ex teachers from the Chartwell congregation have joined in this initiative and offer support working with small groups of students in a class setting.

The initial programme covered exercises of memory (remembering names) and extending to activities relating to each member's background and country of origin.

Subsequent sessions were expanded to include worksheets identifying descriptions of appearances and personality of self and family members, to common descriptions of types of work and workplaces, leading to conversations about the range of activities required of workers in a variety of settings and later reading scripts of conversations between workers. The emphasis is on communication fluency, not correctness. This term's session started this week and encompassed a number of open ended questions which lead to discussion and a lot of hilarity.



It is not all serious and there is a lot of laughter and fun generated. We share information about work and one of our students was excited to share that she had recently won a teaching position at a local high school. There is a good balance of both male and female students and often we have school age students join us. They bring a refreshing tenor to the group. These young people will integrate into our society as they feel very welcome in our country and have had very positive experiences since arriving here. Some of the members are engaged in various avenues of IT and they enjoy being able to use their computer skills in meaningful work for which they get a good wage!

Hospitality is offered at each session. This gives members a chance to exchange greetings in a relaxed setting and share their recent experiences. A keen sense of fun has been the hallmark during all sessions.

The classes follow the school terms with a two to three week break between each term. New members would be very welcome. 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

At the Sunset Symphony

Helping Hukarere

E te Whanau a te Karaiti, sisters and brothers in Christ,

During this past week I was privileged to visit some of the places most affected by Cyclone Gabrielle and to spend time with people deeply impacted.

One of those places was our own Hukarere Maori Girl's College in the Esk Valley.

We gathered at the site and prayed together and offered our love and support to staff and Old Girls of the School. The school is a total loss.

What struck me more than anything else was just how courageous and decisive the leadership of the College had been the night they evacuated. The decision to evacuate made by the staff at the time seemed precautionary.

In reality had they left it even an hour the result could have been catastrophic. The speed with which the water and mud came, and the height at which it came through the school would have had tragic consequences.

The girls are safe and with their families because of the actions of those who were responsible for their care. Staff and student a like lost nearly everything they had with them at the school. They went simply carrying the 'grab bags' they had prepared.

We are acting quickly to establish an online learning environment for the girls so they can be immediately supported in their education. As part of this Spark along with



Hewlett Packard are supplying 60 laptops at cost. All equipment at the school is of course lost.

One laptop costs \$861.00. The Standing Committee of the Diocese yesterday agreed to contribute \$5,000 to this laptop appeal. The small congregation at Patea when I spoke of this today immediately put their hands in their pockets and raised half the value of a computer, and further commitments from those at that service means that one computer has been funded from that one small community.

Could your community commit to raising money for one Computer for a Hukarere student?

I know many of you have generously given to the Missions Board fund raising appeal and thank you so much for that support. And we are going to send this specific appeal to every Anglican School, inviting them to contribute to this very specific need at Hukarere but I also wanted to give an opportunity to any in our Diocese who would like to respond to this very specific and targeted need.

Hukarere is a remarkable community; a school we all, as Anglicans, can be so very proud of. Certainly being on the Trust Board that owns the school has been one of great privileges of my time as Archbishop. So yes, I do have both a personal investment in this school and personal knowledge of the staff and students.



Joy in Our Weakness by Marva J. Dawn


Hand in Hand by Ian Harris


